As things creep back to some form of normality we keep being asked when your monthly lunches will start again.

We are rewarded by hearing how they were appreciated. Sometimes it is not until you lose something that you realise you miss it!

However having had to stop the lunches since March 2020, we have concluded that this is the (unnatural) break we would have to come to at some time.

Those of us who have provided this facility for some 15 years have done so for long enough. We know that we are older than a good many of our customers, and we no longer feel able to continue.

Having said that, if there are younger retired (or not retired) who would like to take on buying and cooking the roasts, preparing and cooking the veg, organising the desserts and the helpers rosters, and complying with

NNDC hygiene standards, we would be glad to offer advice on the operation and work with a new team until it's settled in.

Meanwhile the Southrepps Support Scheme continues to fund the Mardler with helpful contributions from the Parish Council and the Townlands Trust.

We also still hold medical equipment for loan e.g., wheelchairs, walkers, crutches etc.

We continue to maintain the two defibrillators and thank the Parish Council for helping to pay for new batteries.

We would also like to pay tribute to Steve Briggs who sadly died recently. Steve assiduously looked after the Lower St defib for us since its installation.



“Steve Briggs, with his much loved animals. Steve, who died suddenly in July, did a great service to the village co-ordinating the heating oil syndicate, and servicing the Lower St defibrillator for many years. Respect for his years of quiet service to society was much in evidence by the presence of the Fire Service Standard, and the large turnout at his funeral service in Cromer.”

VILLAGE HALL

WOWee we must say a huge thank you to the team who worked on this alongside the Parish Council - it is extremely pleasing to view the end result. It was great to see the village hall being used for a wedding on Saturday 25th September however, it meant that the Parish Council had to meet in the hallway.....it was bright and light and we managed well.

What have we been doing? The Audit and Accounts came round again and we completed these in a timely manner. We have managed the assets and continued to maintain them.

HIGHWAYS

Highways are working on the 20mph zone for the High Street and we understand people's frustration on this matter. It will happen eventually and with any project of this type it takes years for it to be developed and then instigated by the authorities. Patience, patience and more patience.

NEW HOUSING ON LONG LANE

The development at Long Lane is progressing and the Parish Council worked with the community to object to this development. However, we were assured that if it did progress that the community would benefit via a 106 agreement for community improvements.

The amount allocated is £25,674.19. This income has to be spent on the play area, playing field and the allotments. A plan is being drawn up to allocate the funds and it is considered that additional allotments be created.

- The old swings are to be replaced and moved to a slightly different location.
- A new zone will be created for fitness which incorporates a number of outside gym items.
- 2-3 new hardy benches will be purchased and installed.

We may need to source additional funding to complete the project however. That will be based on the items selected by the Council or the public, if they wish to add their opinions/views, which will be welcome.

VILLAGE SIGN

We would like to extend our sincere thanks to the Southrepps Society for taking charge of the restoration of the two village signs (upper and lower). They have taken a strong lead on this and we would like to extend our sincere thanks to the team for their sterling efforts.

CROWN LANE

Concern has been raised by residents in connection with the demolishing of structures within a property along Crown Lane along with the exit created without permission. The Parish Council is seeking legal advice on this matter and working alongside the NNDC Planning Enforcement Team.

THE COMMUNITY BOTTLE BANKS BRING FUNDS INTO YOUR PARISH

PLEASE, please make the effort to take them to either the Village hall or Lower Southrepps opposite Antingham School. Every bottle/jar put into the bank is approximately 1-2p towards community initiatives such as the Mardler and defibrillator maintenance. The income is slowly declining and it is important that instead of putting them in your green recycling bin that they are put in the Bottle Banks. Let all your neighbours know.

The Parish Council pays for the emptying of the Bank and receives a yearly payment upon a tonnage claim made to NCC. We do not want to lose this income.

DOG FOULINGS

NOTE – if you have dog “deposits” these can be placed into your own personal refuse bin. It has been noted that resident(s) of the Parish are taking their dog’s foulings from home to the red dog bins. This is not necessary and costs the Parish Council additional money to have these bins emptied more frequently. These additional charges are passed onto the residents via the Precept.

There have been reports along the High Street where dog deposits have been left on a householder’s windowsill and in their entrance.

NNDC has been notified of this deliberate act and are monitoring and patrolling Southrepps to deter this behaviour.



VILLAGE TRAFFIC

We continue to monitor the traffic flows and speed of traffic with our SAM2 sign and are concerned that particularly in Upper Street vehicles are entering the 30 mph zone at speeds well in excess of the limit.

We are also hoping to have the Loke which leads to the village hall surface dressed via the NCC Parish Partnership Scheme.

We hope that you consider this major traffic calming scheme, which will benefit everyone in the long term, warrants the small financial increase per household.

The past year and a half for the Village Hall has been far from normal, as has been the case for everyone during these turbulent times. Unfortunately, for significant periods of 2020 and early 2021 the hall was forced to shut its doors in line with government guidance. However, we worked hard to ensure that the hall was open for use at any point it was allowed and this required significant amounts of work to ensure the hall was 'Covid compliant' and risk assessments were in place and in line with the quickly changing guidance.

Southrepps Village Hall, however, was fortunate enough to be eligible for some government funding during this time and for this we are extremely grateful. It means today we are in the position that the hall is back up and running in a (fairly) normal way and we are back to providing a community space for local clubs, support groups and private celebrations. We would like to thank everyone who uses the hall and continues to support it.

As well as ensuring the hall remained a safe environment over the past months, the Village Hall Committee have continued

to ensure the hall is maintained and cared for during this time. Amongst other things, we have had a new fire alarm system installed, curtain tracks replaced and repairs made to the roof following damage in high winds, all alongside the general maintenance and attending to financial matters. Thank you to all the members of the committee for their continued support and a special thanks to Shelley and Ken for their time and effort throughout the pandemic.

By far our biggest project though has been the renovation of the toilets in the Village Hall. All the toilets have been entirely overhauled and redecorated, as has the entrance hallway, which has created an open and welcoming space. We even have a shower room being installed for use by regular hall users such as Southrepps FC. It is a huge improvement on what previously existed and I'm sure you'll have difficulty recognising the place when you next visit! We will continue to try to adapt and improve the hall to ensure it remains a place people want to visit.

With that in mind, we hope that we will soon be in a position to host Village Hall events again. All being well we hope to invite you to one of our popular quiz nights early in the New Year, so look out for details on our Facebook page and village posters.

In the meantime, please remember us for your next celebration or event and visit our website for booking enquiries. Please also feel free to contact us if you are interested in joining the Village Hall Committee, we are always happy to welcome new members.

We are finally able to share details of the 20 MPH Zone proposed for the centre of Southrepps which was requested by residents for some years now.

Some will have already received the letter drop advising them of this proposal if they live within the zone as proposed.

We originally anticipated only lowering the speed limit on Thorpe Road, High Street and part of Chapel Street with the associated traffic calming measures.

We have subsequently decided to stretch the budget as far as possible benefiting as many of the connected roads as we could that fit the relevant criteria.

Now included is part of Long Lane, Sandy Lane, Church Street, and Gables Road.

Half of the costs of the traffic calming measures proposed are to be met by the Parish Council.

The County Council will meet the other half of those costs, with the legal and design work being paid for using my Local Members Fund.

I have been trying to visit the village as often as I can to find highways defects or other issues. This has recently resulted in 17 issues being

programmed for repair including overgrown signs, road surface damage, and small section of deteriorated pavement on Beechlands Park.


We also have a longstanding issue to resolve on Wellspring Road due to a section collapsing due to considerable historic badger sett activity, but we are still waiting for Natural England to give us assistance in safely resolving this matter without harming any wildlife. The road will remain partially closed until we are able to ascertain if a safe repair is yet possible.

I am always happy to discuss these, or any other Council matters.



News from St James

It has been a very challenging time for everyone since Siân took up her role as Rector of Poppyland in November 2019. The pandemic and lockdowns have played havoc with church services and church finances both locally and nationally.

The Diocese of Norwich suffered a £2 million hit to its income last year which has resulted in a redundancy programme across the diocese with a 10% reduced headcount of both clergy and support staff. Fortunately and happily we have Siân securely in place, however she is now residing outside the village at her own expense, and the Diocese benefits financially from being able to let the rectory on the private rental market.

Although the church is currently closed to visitors and for services because of the building repairs, it should be open again from the end of November. Here are current plans for November and December.

We have brought back into use the Parish office at St. James Church, purpose built in the late 1990's through the generosity of the Bartram Trust, as a base for Siân in the Benefice. Having to look after a large medieval building is always going to be a challenging responsibility. Many villagers will have seen the scaffolding and the work being carried out on the church roof. Storm damage and natural deterioration brought us to a point where we had holes in the roof, and actually quite a dangerous situation where falling slates had become a major safety concern. Additionally our latest 'quinquennial' (the five-yearly church building survey) highlighted some other areas of serious decay to walls, buttresses and lead flashings. All this added up to a cost of £40,000 (net of VAT) and after a lot of hard work in grants applications spearheaded by Max Marriner, we were able to get the project fully funded. Many thanks to Heritage England, to the Headley Trust and to our own Bartram Trust for their contributions to this essential work.

Southrepps Common



The last time you heard from the volunteers helping Norfolk Wildlife Trust to manage our commons was two years ago. Since then, the Covid pandemic has done a lot to disrupt the lives of everyone, but has passed un-noticed by the plants and wildlife living on our five special sites. Nonetheless, our ability to work on them was hampered, because we usually work in groups (highly sociable ones, as it happens) and the social distancing rules applied to us as much as everyone else. NWT was particularly watchful about the welfare of its volunteers, and issued strict instructions about what we could do once the most severe restrictions began to ease, having cancelled all volunteering activities in mid-March 2020. When we were able to re-start, it was with a maximum team size of six, so we had to change our practices to accommodate that. As you would expect, our highly adaptable and committed volunteers adjusted very well, and we got as much work done as could be reasonably managed.

Work parties were suspended again in January 2021. They restarted in May, but this meant that a chunk of time-sensitive work on the SSSI and Pit Common, which can only be done in the winter months to avoid disturbance to nesting birds, was missed. We were able to do some removal of Himalayan Balsam after careful checking that there were no nesting birds in the areas affected. Even now, some Balsam is flowering, and this highly invasive plant is pulled up whenever and wherever possible. Currently we are back to working at full capacity (the average working party attendance is almost 14, with a magnificent 23 attending the last one of August), but who can say what restrictions may return this winter? We have been delighted to welcome eight new volunteers joining our ranks recently; every single one is very welcome, and we have plenty of room for more! At the time

of writing 35 individuals have volunteered so far this year, and we have clocked up 360 hours of work between us. The picture of the central area in June perhaps gives an idea of why we do it.

Most people, locals as well as visitors, are generally supportive of the work that we do on behalf of NWT to maintain this special place. In the case of the rare valley fen habitat, to leave it un-managed would inevitably result in its fairly rapid succession to a scrubby woodland, instead of the reed bed and the grassy areas which are so precious for hosting such a range of uncommon plants, and of course the specialised animal life that depends on them. As has become clear in recent years, fens, marshes and bogs perform a vital role in carbon capture, even more so than woodland, so by preserving even little patches like this Southrepps is doing a bit towards mitigating the climate crisis.

A significant milestone was reached recently, with the scattering of seeds on an embryo wildflower meadow at Pit Common. A lot of hard work was put into preparing a small portion of the area, before loose seeds and 'green hay' were strewn over it in scenes



reminiscent of an ancient folk dance. Seeds in the mix included oxeye daisy, sulphur clover, field scabious, yellow rattle, cowslip, common bird's-foot-trefoil and meadow vetchling. It's very early days yet, but we firmly hope that Pit Common will become a riot of colour and life in the next few years.

The whiteboard at the Information Point at the Lower Street entrance to the boardwalk has been well used, and we have passed on almost 290 sightings to NWT, excluding Alpacas and even more exotic reports of dragons and dinosaurs! This includes a creditable 117 different species, demonstrating the biodiversity value of the commons.


