

"3 dollars each for a short tour of the Medina? Festival of Ibrahim & Isaac for 3 days, today day 3, but most places shut. Never mind, I take you to 2 places I know, nice things for you to see, and customary tea and hospitality. I take very slow for Mrs Mariam".

Having taken the shuttle bus into the centre, we were latched firmly onto by a guide before our feet were off the steps. Taken in hand, we proceeded downhill, through one of the 13 gates, now permanently open, and into the medina warren – past a fruit shop flogging large, and I mean very large, green figs, and even some we were more familiar with. We meandered down further, left, then right, deeper into the maze, totally reliant now on the guide "our friend". He proudly drew attention to all the modern wooden doors that since Covid the Government had installed, to make the place look better. He dismissed our protest against removing the character of the old doors – "No, much better"!

Finally we were ushered into a large, well stocked 'emporium', full of local stuff – ceramics, carvings, carpets, leather goods, jewellery, silver etc. This was clearly where he would pick up some commission if we bought. Intro's all round, elderly statesman in his 70's, English & French, usual effusive approach. We looked around, liked the blue & white plates, & the silver bracelets. Then came the mint tea, very hot, very minty, and surprisingly refreshing.

So, we chose a plate & a bracelet, took advantage of the local facilities, which by this time was much needed. Then the bargaining began – he far too high, - we much too low, -he came down, - we go up a bit, -still too low, - we walk away, thanking for the tea!

We tipped him for getting us back safely to the bus, but also for the memorable experience we knew from the outset, we were letting ourselves in for!

Chairman's Corner

Since its inception in 1992 with such familiar names as Hazel Glaister, Sue Arnold and Elizabeth Bailey, and with the backing of the Parochial Church Council, the Southrepps Support Scheme has provided wide ranging benefits to the village community. Trustees felt that putting these funds to use like this, would be giving long term benefit back to the community, including to the two charities that use the Village Hall weekly.

A huge vote of thanks is due to all those volunteers who have helped the SSS over the years.

CAR PARKING AT THE VILLAGE HALL

Work should commence imminently on the cutting back of the vegetation at the Village Hall car park. It is hoped that this will encourage users to park in a more formal manner therefore, allowing additional vehicles to use the space when accessing the Village Hall.

Over the year we have been monitoring vehicles which have been deposited at the location for long periods of time. This has caused additional work for the Council as we need to ensure that this area does not become a graveyard for end of life vehicles. The car park is continually monitored for these type of vehicles and the owners and Police are contacted to ensure that they are removed. Every car that is left in situ for long periods of time deprives others of the use of the facility. It also discourages bookings to the village hall which are vital for its continual survival.

20 MPH ZONE

We have noted the number of accidents at the build out exiting the village towards Thorpe Market. This is being closely monitored and Highways are aware of the various scenarios for the accidents. There is further signage to be installed and we are waiting action from the Highways Department.

SAM2

The Council regularly downloads the speeds for analysis and as required requests the Police to complete speed checks. We have applied for a new SAM3 from NCC via the Parish Partnership Scheme to enhance and reinforce the speed limit within the village.

THE PLAYING FIELD

We would like to thank members of the public for reporting any issues to the Council which they consider a problem at the Playing Field. The Council endeavours to address these matters extremely promptly. The play equipment is inspected every year by a RoSPA qualified assessor and the report forwarded to the Council for consideration and to make financial allowances for future repairs.

DOG BAG DISPENSER

We are pleased that the initial excitement for the provision of dog bags at the playing field has dissipated. We now seem to have a natural pattern of use which allows for better provision for everyone.

PERIMETER FENCE AND ENCLOSURE TO TODDLER AREA

The Council has now replaced the fencing and we hope that you all consider that it has enhanced and upgraded the area.

LOWER SOUTHREPPS

The Council has replaced and installed a new bench located at Lower Southrepps as the incumbent unit had become beyond repair and lifespan.

DEFIBRILLATORS

The Council has adopted the defibrillators within the Village from the Southrepps Support Scheme. Volunteers still manage the units however, the cost and insurance is covered by the community.

SOUTHREPPS IS A CONSERVATION AREA

The Council has installed an additional matching bench at The Green, Long Lane as requested. It is positive to see it is well used especially in the summer months by the community.

We lobbied Highways for a new sign to warn drivers of pedestrians at the junction of RB20 and the Thorpe Road and this has recently been installed.

The Council worked in conjunction with the Bowls Club to upgrade their electric supply. We engaged with Highways to improve the drainage along the footpath to the play area and this is observed on an ongoing basis.

We were proactive in the restoration of the bench outside of the Church as it had decayed over the years. We would like to thank a local resident for re-instating the concrete plinth. The cost for carpentry work was covered by the Council as it is a great place to sit and rest.

The Council agreed a £500 contribution to the Church towards the upkeep and maintenance of the area. Members are considering a yearly contribution of £1,000 towards this continuous cost.

The Council took over the responsibility for the grass cutting of the urban/amenity areas within the village at agreed locations. This has allowed the Parish Council to determine when it considers the grass should be cut by the appointed contractors. We have agreed to refrain cutting of the peninsula area which abuts Sandy Lane into the High Street as this will be left for biodiversity and wildflowers. However, if this area hinders visual splay and access then, it will need to be trimmed down.

Please put all glass into the bottle banks located at the playing field and opposite the school. We understand it is an extra effort however, every bottle contributes funds to your community. Thank you to all who do.

For the first meeting of 2025, member Michael Giddings told us about the history of Dragon Hall, the mediaeval Merchant's Hall, in Norwich where he helps as a volunteer.

28 members attended the AGM in February with food of course!

At the beginning of March, several members helped to tidy up the old Chapel Yard which belongs to the Society. Later in the month 21 members carried out a litter pick throughout the village followed by delicious refreshments in the Village Hall. Our speaker in March was Debs Chedgey from the village who, with a colleague, told us about the incredible work of Norfolk Lowland Search and Rescue. In April historian and author Helen Murray gave a talk on "Fishermen, Bathers and Beach Folk" – photos of the early development of Cromer into a seaside resort.

At the beginning of May, we staged a small exhibition of photos and items relating to WW2 to commemorate VE Day. At the end of the month we had our first walk of the year at Sheringham Park on a beautiful evening.

In June 14 members made a trip to Dragon Hall with a guided tour by Michael. 32 members attended the annual Barbecue at the Village Hall. Instead of our usual walk in July we had a private visit to Cromer Museum

and a brief historical tour of Cromer on a very stormy evening.

For our first autumn meeting at the end of September, we welcomed Dr. Tim Willey who owns part of Warren Woods in Lower Street. He told us how he was trying to renew the landscape of the woods to make them more sustainable and wildlife friendly. He promised to organise a visit to the woods in the spring. We are looking forward to a talk by artist Jayne Ivimey in October and a talk on the Battle of the Somme in November.

He lived most of his life in Southrepps, had countless amusing local anecdotes, loved the village and the Church. He was a master craftsman, responsible for the fine oak woodwork at the West end of St James' Church. He was also an expert and generous wood turner. His other passions were Shackletons and Bell Ringing. With a long and respected ringing record to be proud of, he even made demanding new bell wheels when the church bells were overhauled and enhanced in the 1980's. A full church saw him off. Hello, this has been another busy year for myself and the Charity. We have had more people coming to our support groups, new faces from our local area as well as people from as far as GT Yarmouth.

As a Support group we aim to help people with early onset dementia or the early stages of dementia. Having representatives from The Alzheimer's Society and Admiral nurses visit us regularly enriches our discussions with expert knowledge. We also provide in-depth advice about Legal Power of Attorney, Financial advice, Assistive technology and much more. But beyond expert advice, our core mission is to provide a friendly and understanding environment. We recognise that sometimes, it's just as important to have a shoulder to lean on — someone who truly understands what you are going through. At our meetings, people will find a community ready to empathise and support, to share stories, and to cultivate friendships that can last beyond the coffee cups.

Away from the Charity I have been busy working with Dementia UK to try and improve the NHS pathway for people with dementia and to try and bring help more into rural areas and less centralised. This has involved a lot of emails to MP's and time talking to the people who will eventually make a decision. Progress is slow, but the realisation of how many people are affected by dementia is turning the tide in our favour.

We produced a booklet about the history of the club this year to record its story for future generations. Able to date it back as far as 1838 means there are 187 years of village life and families that have enjoyed bowls at Southrepps.

Ladies weren't allowed to join until 1971 and it was a big turning point for the club when they could. Husband's wives joined them and a more sociable calendar followed with cheese and wine and coffee mornings. More matches were played amongst the members rather than just league games, and a few ladies joined on their own to get involved with a sport.

Southrepps Bowls club has always been looked after by its members. We cut the green, and tend to the garden, look after the clubhouse, pavilion and toilets. We have a small committee that oversees the general running of the club. Probably all mucking in to look after it helps us to be such a friendly, enthusiastic group of people. Of course we love to bowl too. Please don't think its just for old people! It is an incredibly clever game with tactics and challenges. There is a skill to delivering a really good bowl.

We currently play in two leagues, and we think we have done quite well in both this year. We have roll ups during the week amongst ourselves and special matches such as The Presidents Cup and President v Chairman Trophy. Although our outdoor bowls season is April to September, we do use our clubhouse throughout the winter for table tennis, pool, table football and a Dutch game called Sjoelbak. It is good to get together socially throughout the year when the weather isn't so good.

We managed to get our footpath accessing the green and clubhouse replaced, making us more disability friendly and raised money to get a defibrillator fitted. Virtually the whole club turned up for CPR training.

It was so nice to welcome in the Summer the Southrepps dementia 'SO' group for a bowl, we all had a great time together.

We are keen to welcome new members to our bowls club. The game of bowls is becoming more popular again and in 2026 will be in the commonwealth games, we may not be up to their standard, but everyone needs to start somewhere! All ages are welcome. Southrepps Commons

It's hardly surprising that after many years of sitting on saturated ground, parts of the main boardwalk across the Common are deteriorating. The Norfolk Wildlife Trust is gradually replacing it, concentrating on the worst sections. including the bridge over the Beck at the Lower Street car park. The main work season for us volunteers starts with the mowing of the central area of the Common - the bit where so many ecologically important wet fen plants

grow. It's a major reason for the designation of the place as a Site of Special Scientific Interest, and is constantly monitored. Encroaching reeds are a problem, so a combination of mowing and hand pulling is used to prevent them from overwhelming the rarer species. An important plant here is Marsh Lousewort, which parasitises grasses, sedges and rushes, thereby keeping them in check. It is a pink-flowered relative of yellow rattle which parasitises grasses.

Once that section is done, we move on to the Warren Road side of Fox's Beck. This is divided into two sections by the boardwalk, being alternately cut every other year. This year it's been the turn of the half nearest Lower Street, although the top of the other half has also had attention as it too is becoming overrun by reeds.



Once those two areas are done, work on the main reedbeds is scheduled for the New year, so that usually leaves us time before Christmas to work on Pit Common and School Common. (There are of course five Southrepps Commons in total.)

Most of our work is restricted to the autumn and winter, leaving the place undisturbed as much as possible during the allimportant breeding and growing season. We do however have to carefully go in after the aggressively invasive Himalayan

Balsam during the summer, to endeavour to prevent it from spreading, if not eliminate it.

It's tempting fate to say it, but we're usually lucky with the weather. However, even if we usually evade the rain, the consequence of it is waterlogged ground, and last December's sole outing was no exception. Wellies are essential: sometimes full diving gear seems preferable! Regardless of the weather we also have lots of sociable fun!

In 2024 we averaged 13 people per work party, and in total we put in 641 volunteer hours on NWT's behalf. We're always looking for new volunteers, especially those who want to learn to use the equipment: you can contact us on email via scommonsvolunteers@gmail.com if you fancy joining us, or simply turn up at one of our sessions, which are advertised at the Information Point at the Lower Street end of the boardwalk. Also there is a whiteboard for people to share their sightings: these are collated and sent to NWT for monitoring purposes. In 2024 we sent in 527 records, representing 128 different species; mostly birds and plants, but with a smattering of other wildlife.

A Wonderful Start to the Year at Antingham and Southrepps Primary School and Nursery




