NOVEMBER

This is always a daunting meeting for the Council as it has to review its spending plans for a 3 year period. This is not easy and everyone hates their costs going up and bad news. However, the central Government grant has now been totally eroded and is nil and the residents now have to pick up that shortfall. In the financial year 19-20 this amounted to £622. The Parish Council therefore has to account for this loss of income as well as look to the future.

20MPH ZONE

We have been working closely with Tim Adams our County Councillor to reduce speed in the village and have campaigned and requested for a 20mph zone in the centre for over 10 years. The Council has received guide figures to achieve this aim.

The Members considered this matter at length and thought that the speeding through the village is such a major issue that it needed to be addressed and Tim's offer of help was just too good to walk away from. The figures from the SAM2 clearly evidence that there is a speeding problem throughout the parish and shows that 80% of vehicles speed in our village.

There needs to be a full consultation undertaken and with legal fees this cost is circa £6,000. Tim Adams has agreed to fund this element out of his allocated budget over a two year financial period – being 2020 to 2022. To run alongside this there will be £3,000 for the design and layout of the scheme and then approximately £10,000 for the traffic calming measures to implement the 20mph.

It is anticipated that the collective £13,000 for the design/layout and the highways works will meet the criteria of the Norfolk County Council 50/50 Scheme which would mean that the community of Southrepps would need to find £6,500 from the Precept it raises from our residents.

In order to implement this project and account for the loss of the Government grant the members agreed to increase the Precept for the financial year from £14,500 to £16,500 an increase of £2,000. This equates to approximately £6 per household per annum and will show on your Council Tax bill of around a 14% increase.

The balance of the funding for this initiative will be derived from reserves over a 2-3 year period.

We are also hoping to have the Loke which leads to the village hall surface dressed via the NCC Parish Partnership Scheme.

We hope that you consider this major traffic calming scheme which will benefit everyone in the long term, warrants this small financial increase per household.

DOG FOULINGS

NOTE – if you have dog "deposits" these can be placed into your own personal grey refuse bin. It has been noted that resident(s) of the Parish are taking their dogs fouling's from home to the red dog bins. This is not necessary and costs the Parish Council additional money to have these bins emptied more frequently. These additional charges are passed onto the residents via the Precept.

There have been reports along the High street where dog deposits have been left on a householder's windowsill and in their entrance.

NNDC has been notified of this deliberate act and are monitoring and patrolling Southrepps to deter this behaviour.

YOU MUST DISPOSE OF YOUR FOULINGS CORRECTLY OR YOU WILL BE FINED.

CO-OPTION OF NEW MEMBER

The Council were extremely pleased to welcome Chris Shaw who was co-opted to the Parish Council. Chris is an active member of the community and will continue in his role as our SAM co-ordinator. We are hopeful that he will be able to assist with other tasks.

SOUTHREPPS COMMONS TRUST

The completion of the transfer of Land to Norfolk Wildlife Trust has now been completed. We are all aware that this was going to be a lengthy and difficult task to undertake. However, the outcome for the community and NWT will be worthwhile. This does not affect villagers' rights to use the commons – please continue to do so.

WELLSPRING ROAD

NCC Highways are currently investigating how to keep this road open and it is being regularly monitored.

SOU02 - VICTORY HOUSING -LONG LANE

We are still waiting to learn of any progress. As yet we have not been advised of any further amendments.

RECREATION GROUND

We have recently carried out minor repairs to the play area and equipment. If you find any issues with any of the units please let us know.

SPEEDWATCH

We are STILL seeking more members to join the team otherwise this community initiative may fold. This is a deterrent against speeding within your village – please come forward and help. Pick up that phone or email us.

SAM2 - FLASHING SPEED SIGN

The SAM Team undertake an amazing job moving the unit and we are going to supply

regular updates from the data unit on the Parish Council website for all to view.

ALLOTMENTS

These are currently all rented but if you would like to be placed onto the waiting list please let us know.

WHITE VILLAGE ENTRANCE GATES

We are currently waiting for these to be installed by the Highways Department and hope that they will help drivers focus on their speed in the centre of the village.


The Gamekeeper

After 16 years as a young gamekeeper on the Sladden estate, Andrew Lincoln now has a family to nurture, as well as his pheasants! He and his wife Helen, have a lovely daughter, Mary, now just 4 months.



The village will be familiar with Andrew as he buzzes around on his John Deere Gator, tending his charges. Trained in



Andrew works to create good habitat by planting cover crops of maize and small bird mixes like millet. This also helps overwintering wild birds. There are up to 6 feeding and watering stations on every cover crop and Andrew goes around servicing these, including distributing some 7 tons of song bird feed annually. Game birds get wheat. He also establishes flower and nectar mixes for the benefit of

bees and other insects.

Shooting season is from September to February. There are on average shoots on 12 days a month. These are private shoots for friends, family and guests. There are no paying customers. Numbers to be shot are restricted by moving around various estate sites. Any birds not wanted by participants, are taken for processing and onward sale by a game dealer.

Asked how he felt about seeing his birds shot, he said that his reward was seeing the

birds fly well and providing a good level of satisfaction. If he felt any emotion he was in the wrong job!

Andrew continues to feed any pheasants and partridge left, to keep them in good breeding condition. He traps vermin and corvids, which are a constant threat. There are some economic benefits to beaters and local hostelries, and definite environmental advantage from conservation work in woods, hedge laying and planting. Several miles of replacement hedging have been planted around the estate, which are good for shelter and nesting. He

arranges walks for various interest groups like young farmers, members of the Game & Wildlife Trust and the Southrepps Society.

Andrew is justifiably proud to have received a special award for his conservation work from renowned gunmakers, Purdy's, which was presented to him at a ceremony in London.

Fly Tipping

Southrepps Commons the story continues

As reported by the 'Common Man' in his valedictory piece in the previous edition of 'The Mardler', following lengthy negotiations (sound familiar?), ownership and responsibility for the management of the Southrepps Commons passed from Southrepps Parish Council to Norfolk Wildlife Trust (NWT) in February of this year. Our much-loved Common Man felt that was the appropriate time to draw a line under the pieces he had written for The Mardler with such distinction for so long. He still plays a major role with the volunteers working on The Commons and we still want to keep the community informed about them, so your new correspondent has taken up the reins. We have a blog (see below) which will be used as the basis for future updates here.

The main Common (the bit with the boardwalk meandering through the rustling reeds) is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), and as such it has received the greatest attention in order to satisfy the requirements of Natural England, the body which ensures such places are kept in the condition which their designation demands. In our case, that designation includes some of the rich diversity of plants found there, typical of the very rare mire habitat still hanging on in this corner of the county. It also includes some animals, most memorably being the species of fly which makes its living eating snails. There is great scope for researching what other minibeasts frequent the place, but plants are very well covered: the latest published list of plants found here runs to an impressive 498 species. Birds, butterflies and moths are also well recorded.

As regular readers will be well aware through the Common Man's updates, all the work of maintaining The Commons was done by a dedicated corps of local volunteers, under the aegis of Southrepps Commons Trust. Most of those old stagers (and I use the term advisedly) continue to work their socks off in mucky weather and conditions, but now with the NWT banner flying metaphorically above their heads. More are always welcome!

So, what has happened since the transfer? The first and most dramatic job was to sort out the overgrown and dried-up romantically named Pit. NWT employed contractors to dig out the sludge accumulated since the last overhaul a decade or so ago, down to the clay bottom, trying not to go beyond. As well as the bulrushes, properly called Greater Reedmace, Common Reed had multiplied too much, and that pernicious invader Crassula helmsii had also seen fit to join the party. Conveniently, almost as soon as the excavation was finished, the Great Wet Spell began, in stupendous proportions, and in no time at all the pond was full again. The picture shows it as it was at the end of October.

The transfer to NWT coincided with changed requirements from Natural England, meaning that we needed to start our cutting season much earlier than previously; more or less coinciding with our usual resistance to the invasion of Himalayan Balsam. During August and September alone, we clocked up 193.25 volunteer hours cutting the fen, often in exceptionally warm conditions. We were joined by some extra hands from NWT for a further 33 hours to ensure the work was completed by the deadline of 30th September. Next to benefit was School Meadow: I suspect this open space to the side of School Common is often overlooked by visitors.

Loppers and bow saws to the fore, in late October a crack team set about advising the encroaching bushes to mind their manners and stand respectfully at the edge of the meadow, thus allowing the sun's rays to have full effect on the sward below. The



picture shows the splendid result.

SCT's online presence has closed, but fear not, bits live on in the NWT website. Our main page is at

from which are links to further information about the individual commons, and the plants and wildlife found here. Photos of species found on the Commons can be found on the Gallery. Choose 'Southrepps Commons' from the dropdown list of Locations. Filtering by 'Interests' will produce, for example, Invertebrates at Southrepps Common. All very whizzy!

And we're film stars! NWT have produced two videos as part of their Wildlife in Common project, one of which features Southrepps Common and its volunteers. There is plenty of information about the project on the NWT website, with links to both of the films - select 'Commons on Film' on the right hand side of the page: (https://www.norfolkwildlifetrust.org.uk/wildlife-in-norfolk/commons/wildlife-in-common). The 'Wildlife in Common: People and Wildlife' film stars Southrepps: our bit is between 2.17 and 3.12 mins.

I had a fun afternoon recently talking to Ruby Risebrow and Jean Hardingham, about their memories of life in the village, and the contribution they had made to the community.

Ruby, now 82, is from Southrepps. She had a brother and a sister, and went to the local school until she was 16. Thereafter she worked in canneries at North Walsham. She later worked for 15 years at Sidestrand Hall special needs school . She had a vivid memory of 1947 when the village was snowed in, and Bradfield Hall made all their milk available for use, as it couldn't be collected. She remembered Ann Green riding on a tractor/trailer as the May Queen, with Ruby as an attendant. The 2nd Sunday in June was a special day at the Chapel, when many had new clothes. She recalled the Salvation Army singing around the village, and on "The Hill" in Lower St, where the Home Guard also practiced - using pitchforks. "The Hill" had always been a centre of activity, and Ruby recalled moving 28 loads of rubbish from thereabouts to clear it. She said that her late husband had made the Lower St sign, and that there is a halfcrown piece buried beneath it.

Jean, nee Covell, came originally from Gimingham and was one of 2 boys and 3 girls. She was at Gimingham School and North Walsham Secondary Modern. She began work as a cadet nurse at the Overstrand convalescent home, and was then at Meadow Cottage for handicapped children. Her best, and some other memories, were marrying Ruby's brother, Mick Hardingham!

Jean talked fondly of times in the 70's running a youth club in the old village hall, arranging kid's Xmas parties, helping with lunches, and fund raising fetes on "The Hill". They sent filled shoe boxes to





children overseas. They raised £18,000 for the N & N chemo unit by running an indoor Bowls tournament annually for 18 years in the village hall. Jean, like many, was 'volunteered' by Hazel Glaister to work on the Townlands Charity, which she has done for many years.

Both Ruby and Jean were heavily involved with the Lower St Social Club, which had originally been the 'men's club' (with a snooker table donated by a former school headmaster). After much work it reopened as the Social Club in 1983, with Ruby as a busy caretaker, and Jean, volunteered by Ruby, eventually as Chair. The Club has always been a popular activity centre, and there are memories of people having to stand outside to take part in Bingo!

Both reflected that there has always been a degree of friction between the two halves of the village, not least over use of the present village hall. But these two ladies have fond memories of their work for the village, and hope that a younger generation will pick up the baton in years to come.

Buttercups Nursery Class offers school-hour nursery sessions, in an inspiring indoor classroom setting with free flow to the outdoors. Here our Buttercups play alongside our Reception Daisies in a beautiful safe outdoor area, full of natural resources, which is ideal for all weathers.







Personal development and aspirations are taking over the school this term!

We started the year with an amazing visit from two local paramedics and an ambulance (Buttercups were involved too!). The children learnt about first aid and calling for help. The children had a go at using a bandage, trying out a stethoscope and watching how an ECG machine works. Afterwards all the children were able to investigate the inside of the ambulance. We hope as a school that this opportunity may inspire children to want to be either part of the emergency services or be a doctor, nurse or surgeon! At the very least, we hope that if they ever have to encounter paramedics and an ambulance, for whatever reason, they will have the resilience to know they are there to help and not to be scared.

We really hope that the local community like our new 'Slow Down' sign, designed by two of last year's Year 6 children to encourage motorists to reduce their speed, not only around our school, but also the villages!

In our top class, Sunflower Class, the children are looking at structures in topic and design technology. They will be learning all about how structures are built and what makes them stay standing through the test of time. These structures are not your average mini buildings and bridges though....the teacher's specifications are 20cm by

80cm! Looking at their designs and ideas I am sure we must have an architect or two for the future in our class of 23! Maybe will see some replicas of the beautiful building we are lucky enough to call our school (which is currently undergoing some basic remedial work on its windows and doors to try and preserve its historic beauty – as we have failed for a third year to obtain funding to replace the windows that are urgently in need of some TLC).



Poppy Class are working hard on the topic of 'Banquets', looking at healthy eating, food and farming and Daisy Class (Reception) are learning the Little Red Hen story off by heart using actions. To bring the learning to life, both classes visited Letheringsett Watermill, to learn how they produce flour from locally grown wheat. We are also really hoping to have a farmer visit us with a tractor and maybe even visit a local farm! Along with this, in school we are planning to have a go at baking bread and making soup. I am sure we must have a future farmer or a cook or two in Key Stage 1!



In our lovely Buttercups Nursery Class the children have been really engaging in our story sacks. These help to engage children in different books (which are both fiction and

nonfiction) by making them 'come alive'. This includes drawing and decorating pictures linked to the books' theme, making mud playdough ('muddough'), setting up small world toys that are based on the books' characters and setting/s, making the Lighthouse Keepers lunch and creating turquoise glistening 'seadough'. We cannot wait to see the personal interests these little ones develop over time, which we will use to inspire and develop our play and learning curriculums and extend our environment and resource base.

The syndicate has been in operation since August 2001 and now has over 130 members from the parishes of Southrepps, Antingham, Bradfield, Gimingham, Knapton, Northrepps, Roughton, Thorpe Market, Trimingham, and Trunch. The syndicate order for January 2016 took the total quantity of oil ordered since the

formation of the syndicate in August 2001 to 1,002,845 litres.

The syndicate doesn't have any fees and works very simply. Heating oil is ordered five times a year, January, March, May, August and November. You are not obliged to order each time and you can order how ever much you need (there is usually a min of 500 Litres per house). To find out more information simply
