What have we been doing? The Parish elections were held in May 2023 and despite all the reminders, posters and website promotion we did not attract a new member. There are vacancies – if you are interested please let the Clerk know who will guide you in the process and inform what the responsibility and commitment entails.

At the elections - Roy MacDonald was elected as our new North Norfolk District Councillor and has been extremely supportive and active within the Parish.

Members welcomed him with open arms as we had not received any support for a number of years.

We completed the Audit and Accounts regime again and had to have a full external audit due to the monies received and spent during the year. These have now been signed off and available to view on the Council's website.

DEFRIBRILLATORS

The Parish Council was asked to take on the responsibility for the defibrillators within the Parish. We have agreed to do this and are now the Guardians of the equipment. These are located at The Vernon Arms and at Lower Southrepps Social Club. We thank the volunteers for ensuring that they are checked regularly so that they function when needed. NOTE YOU MUST CALL 999 prior to being given access for the code to the unit. You cannot just turn up and decide to use it. It is the 999 service who determine whether the defibrillator is required or not.

WEBSITE

The website has been upgraded and there is a direct email for the Council – Clerk.Southrepps@gmail.com.

DOG FOULING

This is a big problem in Southrepps and it is mandatory that you pick up after your dog. We have received a number of calls regarding this matter and it is especially prevalent along the High Street and the footpath which leads from the Bowls Club down to Lower Southrepps (FP9).

20MPH ZONE THROUGH THE VILLAGE

Highways are still working on the 20mph zone for the High Street and the surrounding area which is truly disappointing. We completely understand people's frustration on this matter. The delay has been to a number of residents objecting to this initiative and therefore additional costs have been incurred with the consultation and its design and delayed its installation. This has cost a great deal of money and investment of time.

GLASS BOTTLE BANK INCOME

The income derived from this source amounted to circa £798 less collection costs. Unfortunately, the income is reducing as people are putting their bottles in the green bin however, we urge every one of you - please take your bottles to the local bottle bank. These funds are spent in your community and help to keep your Precept down. Please make the effort and put every glass jar/bottle into the banks and not in your own recycling bin. Take a walk and make the effort or multi-task when going out. These units are located at the playing field and opposite the school.

LONG LANE FOOTFALL

We were pleased with the outcome of the footpath finally constructed along Long Lane and we hope that residents are pleased with the outcome.

PLAY AREA AND RECREATION FIELD

The S106 Agreement – the amount allocated from the Long Lane Flagship development - £25,674.19 has nearly all been spent. We hope that you all enjoyed using the new facilities over the summer months.

Just to confirm what was achieved with this funding:

3 robust picnic benches, 6 additional allotments with fencing, hedges all cut back. Installation of 6 new pieces of external gym equipment together with new double bay swings. There are to be perching seats placed around the playing field in due course at strategic locations.

The Council has now installed water to the allotments as part of this upgrade and we urge the leaseholders to utilise the facility sparingly. We thank the Village Hall and Bowls Club for assisting us in this task and in helping to trace the source of the water supply.

We have experienced vandalism at the play area and the Council were extremely disappointed to see this. The matter was reported to the Police and the Council arranged for the repairs. These repairs are paid for out of YOUR local Council Tax. Please urge everyone to take care of this excellent facility.

We are aware of the ongoing issue with the perimeter fence which encloses the children's play area and along the play equipment side of the recreation area. We are now frequently repairing it and investigating the cost of a replacement.

PROVISION OF BENCHES

If there are members of the community who would like to sponsor a bench or picnic table, please do let us know. Benches are now being streamlined so that they require less maintenance and they have to be strong and have longevity. The approximate cost of a bench or picnic table is between £400-£700 plus installation. It maybe that a parishioner would like to purchase a unit in memory of a loved one.

COUNTY BROADBAND

The Council is monitoring the progress of these works and has received a number of concerns on the installations which have taken place. These services are required and will be a necessity going forward for everyone; there will be disruption. IF there are major concerns please do let us know and we will liaise with County Broadband.

LOWER SOUTHREPPS

A new noticeboard has been purchased for Lower Southrepps at the Warren Road. It has been delivered and will be installed with the old notice board being removed.

SAM2

We continue to monitor the traffic flows and speed of traffic with our SAM2 sign and are concerned that particularly at Gables Avenue vehicles are entering the 30 mph zone at speeds in excess of the current 30mph limit. The information from SAM is published on the Council's website. This system is managed by two Councillors who we thank for their commitment to movement of the unit and downloading of figures.

If you have any other ideas that you consider the Council could develop please do let us know.

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Southrepps Society

Since our last Mardler report, the society has had a more varied than usual programme of walks, talks and activities.

In January Southrepps resident January Rory Stephens gave us an insight into "The Myths of The Great War." Members brought many interesting

souvenirs to the meeting.

We also held a session learning to identify some of the ancient Flints found in Southrepps during Fieldwalking in previous years. Several Fieldwalking sessions were held during the spring.

February February was our AGM with Soup and Pudding supper.

At the beginning of March a March working party helped to tidy up the Chapel Yard (site of old non conformist chapel owned by the Society.)

Later in March, we held our annual litterpick throughout the village finding less litter than usual. Our Speaker for March was Peter Stibbons talking about the famous "Paston Letters" and his attempt to digitize them.



April In April, Martin Warren – local historian and palaeontologist told us about the latest discoveries on

our Deep History Coast.

For our first walk of the season in May May, we had a walk around Overstrand looking at some of the historic buildings, returning to the Vernon Arms for drinks.

On 20th June, we had a trip to June Gressenhall Museum of Rural Life. 30 members attended the annual Barbecue at the end of the month.

July walked along West Runton beach studying the cliffs. At the end of July, 20 members walked to the Chapel Yard accompanied by members Janet Higgins and Bob Ellis who pointed out an amazing number of wild plants.

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Thank you to those who contributed to our Poppy Appeal boxes in the Vernon Arms and the Shop.

The Branch took part in the Armed Forces Day event in June, organised by North Repps Branch and held in their village hall. A promotional recruitment stand in St James Church during the successful village 'Bash' failed to attract any new members.

A short Armistice Day service was held at St James' War Memorial on 11 November, followed by wreath laying at Signal Arm cross, and the US Sgt Mire tree. A photo of the new wreath at the tree, was sent to the family in USA, who are hugely appreciative.

The Remembrance Sunday service was held in church on 12 November. Names were read, wreaths laid, and the service was conducted by Canon Malcolm France. The Chorale sang, and James Fiddeman, a new trumpeter delivered a memorable Last Post and Reveille.

A Tribute Cross in memory of "Southrepps Boys" was again placed in the Westminster Abbey Field of Remembrance.

The local Branch AGM will need to consider whether the Southrepps & District Branch can continue with so few active, and ageing members?



Southrepps Commons

Since early 2019, when responsibility for the five Southrepps commons passed to Norfolk Wildlife Trust (NWT), we local volunteers have contributed an astonishing 3,270 hours of work on them! The main common on Lower Street takes the majority of our efforts, as it is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) so Natural England set the rules for what has to be done, and when. Nevertheless, the other commons also get a look-in, particularly Pit Common, with its pond, which has sadly become inundated by the appalling New Zealand Pygmyweed (Crassula helmsii.) On the positive side however, an exciting recent development inaugurated by NWT has been the conversion of part of this common to a wildflower-rich area. It's still in its early days, but it is looking promising, with a couple of rarities having already come to light.



CUTTING BACK

Early in the year the focus was on having a serious go at cutting back some of the scrub alongside the boardwalk, which was increasingly impeding walkers. We hope that what we achieved has improved matters, and won't need too much repetition for a few years (see photo).



WASP SPIDER

As well as vital land management, other volunteering work includes comprehensive botanical surveying - we have recorded around 500 plant species, including this year an unusual White Fragrant Orchid (see photo); the passing on to NWT of wildlife sightings noted on the whiteboard at the Information Point at the start of the boardwalk across the main common: maintenance of that boardwalk (an increasingly frequent necessity unfortunately), and fixed-point photography to help NWT monitor how the commons are changing over the years.



WHITE FRAGRANT ORCHID

Alongside the even more important regularly occurring species, notable less usual sightings from the whiteboard this year include Water rail, Chinese water deer, Ring Ouzel, and Wasp spider (see photo). Despite the central area having to be mown during August and September, the ever-popular Grass of Parnassus was able to duck beneath the mower blades and flower gloriously again. Such is the dedication of three of our volunteers that a significant part of this area was spared the mower, and the reeds growing there were pulled up by hand -13.5 hours spent in often very hot weather. Dinosaurs are also often recorded, but only very young visitors can see them!

Sometimes the weather outside is frightful, but touch wood we're rarely badly affected by it. There are occasions when a session has to be called off, but they're mercifully rare. The work parties are also enjoyable social occasions, and many village friendships have started from meeting like-minded pitchforkwielding people! We restrict the work parties to two hours, with a break for refreshments half-way through; these are always very welcome and convivial affairs. We are always keen for new people to join us and are pleased to see some younger volunteers swelling our ranks - more are still required! If you've recently moved to the area, it's also a great way of meeting people, all of whom are wonderful. It's better for you than the Gym, it's free, and you'll be doing your bit to benefit a local nature reserve enjoyed by so many residents and visitors to the area. Although we work under NWT's direction, a few of us are 'team leaders', organising and directing the work sessions: anyone interested in joining that select band would also be very welcome. A recent grant has enabled the company to step up another level and become a leader in welding robotics and automation in the region, ensuring they can continue to offer the latest technical support and expertise to local businesses, enabling them in turn to be globally competitive. The future looks good.

Talking to Harry, an amiable and modest entrepreneur, I asked how a market opportunity had been identified, did it feel like a risky venture, and what did it take to get started? Whilst working nationally as UK Sales Manager for a Danish welding company, Harry knew the trade, and saw the opportunity to set up himself, buying what had been the old bakery in Southrepps from Rowland Woodhouse. It became a family affair. He had considerable help and support from his wife Ibby, who looked after the books and the phone. Their daughter Anna left school and trained as an oxy-fuel station safety tester. Son Ben started as a service engineer, took on sales, and is now the MD.

Harry also spoke highly of the contribution of service manager Andrew Thomas, the first non-family employee, now sadly a victim of MS and in care. Asked why Southrepps, Harry chirped 'Why not. It works". Having lived in his house in the village for 60 years, and having travelled extensively, he would not want to live anywhere else!




